Comment: A large number of papers have been searched for this review, and it is considered worthy of evaluation.

Minor point 1 > Table 1 is too long, complicated, and the amount of information is not organized, so I think it is very difficult to understand as it is.

I think that each item should be summarized as much as possible by summarizing the information.

Reply: Thank you to the reviewer. Table 1 has been shortened, and modified as follows:

The 'intervention' heading has been incorporated with the 'self-resolved' heading.

The 'time to onset of symptoms' has been incorporated into either the 'ingestion symptoms', 'symptoms during CE investigation' or 'symptoms after handling of aspiration', where it fit. It is shown on page 11-12.

Table 2 has also been modified to the same design as Table 1, it is seen on page 13.

Reviewer B

Comment 1: This study investigates the incidence of aspiration during capsule endoscopic swallowing, focusing on an area that has received limited attention until now. The analysis presented in this report is of significant value.

I feel like it is important to address certain aspects that require correction.

As this study is a systematic review, it is crucial to acknowledge the influence of article quality and potential biases in the selection process on the obtained results. However, this aspect is not discussed.

Reply: Thank you to the reviewer. The discussion did indeed need a more thorough elaboration of the possible missing reports and data, as well as the influence of article quality. It has now been modified with points on this on page 6, line 26-34, as advised.

Comment 2: Furthermore, it is worth noting that this review incorporates 45 case reports; however, not all items are presented as data, thereby limiting the analysis based on insufficient information.

Reply: Thank you to the reviewer for this valid point; however, we should not forget that this is a systematic presentation of cases-case series and as such is fraud with all the relevant inherit limitations of such an endeavor, data may not be consistently available for every field
